### Instructor and course information:

Instructor: Dr. Tania Granadillo

Method of delivery: online. It is *asynchronous*, meaning that students will be provided with various lesson materials and activities that can be done throughout the week. However, some tasks, such as quizzes and assignments, must be completed by specific dates.

Audiovisual material: The lessons include various audiovisual materials, which are an integral part of the lesson. You will be tested on this material via quizzes, debates, comprehension questions or written assignments.

Credit value: 0.5

Antirequisites: Anthropology 2216F/G and Indigenous Studies 2216F/G are the same course. Thus, only one can be taken.

Prerequisites: None

### **Course Description:**

A journey into the political and economic history of the region that pays attention to the daily lives, as well as the momentous struggles, of its culturally diverse inhabitants. Topics covered include economic dependency and exploitation, urban poverty, social stratification, "race", indigenous movements, state terror, peaceful resistance and revolution.

A full course schedule including a week-by-week breakdown of topics and assigned readings will be available on the course's OWL Brightspace site before the first day of class.

## Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Explain how colonial and neocolonial processes have shaped Latin America and planted the seeds for past and contemporary counterhegemonic movements.
- Identify how entire nations and marginalized constituencies within them (indigenous communities, workers, the poor,
- women, etc.) have been affected by and have variously reacted to the spread of neoliberal economic and cultural projects.
  Assess the importance, possibilities and limits of revolutionary projects that have attempted to break away from a history of social injustice and colonialism.
- Critique common stereotypes and misconceptions of the area and its inhabitants.
- Demonstrate the value of an anthropological perspective grounded in the particular and the everyday.

## **Course Materials**

No textbook. Required readings will be available through the Course Readings tool on the course site.

### <u> Quizzes on Readings – 25%</u>

Every week there will be a reading quiz on OWL that will cover the reading materials for the current week. This quiz will need to be completed before the lecture is released. This will ensure that everyone is up to date on the readings and will be able to follow and contribute to class presentations and discussions. The lowest 2 quizzes will be dropped and there will be no makeups. Note that there is a quiz on the first week. If students were to miss a quizz for documented reasons, the overall value of the quizzes will be reweighed without the missed one.

#### <u>In lesson questions – 10%</u>

Throughout the course students must submit comments or respond to one or two true/false or multiple-choice questions related to the material presented in the lesson. These questions will be graded and should be completed by the end of the corresponding week. Top 10 will count towards your grade.

#### Homework Assignments 45%

Three times throughout the term there will be an assignment posted on Brightspace. Assignments will have a due date on Wednesday and an extended submission window until Friday. Please note that because the submission deadline for this assessment already includes flexibility in the form of a 48 hour grace period, the instructor reserves the right to deny academic consideration for assignments which are submitted following the end of the period of flexibility.

### <u>Final Exam – 20%</u>

The final exam will be administered according to the final exam schedule, date TBA. There will be a window of 72 hours upon which to access the 90 min exam online. Details about the final exam will be given in class. No makeup will be administered unless the proper procedures are followed. Likewise, students needing special accommodation must follow the proper channels.

This course has 12 quizzes with only 10/12 quizzes counted towards your final grade. Undocumented academic consideration will not be granted for missed quizzes. If students miss 2/10 quizzes, the remaining 10 quizzes will be used in the calculation of the final grade. If students miss more than 2 quizzes, they will receive a grade of zero on each missed quiz.

This course employs flexible deadlines for homework assignments. The assignment deadlines can be found above in the course outline. For each assignment, students are expected to submit the assignment by the deadline listed. Should illness or extenuating circumstances arise, students are permitted to submit their assignment up to 48 hours past the deadline without academic penalty. No assignments will be accepted after that without academic consideration. As flexible deadlines are used in this course, requests for undocumented academic consideration will not be granted. If you have a long-term academic consideration or an accommodation for disability that allows greater flexibility than provided here, please reach out to your instructor at least one week prior to the posted deadline.
