COURSE CONTENT:

This course provides students with a basic "hands on" grounding in the methods and techniques used by archaeologists to recover data in the field, and an introduction to preliminary archaeological data processing in the laboratory. The goal is to provide students with basic skills that can be used in cultural resource management (CRM) or academic research contexts. The skills taught will be applicable in a variety of contexts, but we will be focusing on archaeological methods and techniques commonly applied in Southern Ontario.

The course will be run out of the Museum of Ontario Archaeology (1600 Attawandaron Road, London, Ontario) and students will be expected to meet there at the beginning of each class. Classes will be taught both inside (in the Museum) and outside on an archaeological site in the London area. For the first several weeks (September through early November) students should be prepared to spend most of the classes outdoors. We will move inside to focus on lectures and lab work for most of November and early December. Students will be expected to dress accordingly when working outdoors (warm clothing on cold days, rain gear, appropriate footwear, etc.) and bring necessary accessories (sunscreen, bug repellent, water, lunch, etc.). You will get dirty during the outdoor field activities, so dress appropriately. More details will be provided at the first meeting of the class.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Participate in an archaeological survey conducted by test pitting or pedestrian survey.
- Understand and assist with the process of setting an archaeological grid using survey equipment.
- Apply basic archaeological excavation skills, including troweling, shovel shining, and screening archaeological deposits.
- Recognize, identify and catalogue historic (19th century) artifacts.
- Draw and photograph excavation units and archaeological features in plan view and profile.
- Conduct basic background research for an archaeological study and summarize the results in a report format.
- Describe basic archaeological methodology and conduct a descriptive analysis of a small 19th century artifact collection.
- Discuss the archaeological assessment process in Ontario and the way in which Aboriginal communities may be engaged in that process.

REQUIRED READINGS:

The main resources for this course are documents from the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture, and Sport (MTCS) that are used to regulate archaeological activities in Ontario. They are available to download in PDF format online, either through OWL or the MTCS website. The main document is:

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS:

a) Field notes: Students will be provided with notebooks and instructions for the completion of field notes. They will be graded based on their completeness, accuracy, and legibility.

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- b) Assignment 1 This assignment involves conducting background research for a historic archaeological site and presenting the results in a report. It is due Nov. 24, 2017. Detailed requirements for of this assignment will be made available in the Nov. 10th class. Students are required to hand in a hard copy in class and upload a digital copy using the Turnitin feature in OWL.
- c) Assignment 2 This assignment involves completing a brief archaeological report describing the results of our field course excavations. It is due on Dec. 8, 2017. Each student will write a brief Archaeological Licence Report involving a description of the fieldwork conducted, a brief analysis of artifacts collected and interpretation of the results of the field project. The format will be similar to the requirements in the Ontario Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport's *Standards and*

Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists. Grading will be based on the completeness, accuracy and presentation of the results. Detailed requirements for this assignment will be made available in the Nov. 24th class. Students are required to hand in a hard copy in class and upload a digital copy using the Turnitin feature in OWL.

COURSE SCHEDULE:

We will need to be flexible for the Friday field sessions due to the vagaries of the weather. Students should come to the Museum on Friday mornings prepared to go into the field. If field sessions are cancelled due to weather, we will process artifacts or have a lecture at the Museum (or both). A tentative schedule is outlined below. Any significant changes to the schedule will be posted on the course OWL site, so you should check it regularly.

September 8th

Introduction to the course, discussion of logistics for field component, safety in the field, pedestrian survey, use of survey equipment and setting up a grid.

September 15, 22, 29, October 6, 20, 27th, Nov. 3rd.

Weather permitting, we will be spending these seven classes in the field at an archaeological site in the London area. The class will meet at the Museum of Ontario Archaeology at 8:30 am, travel to the site, work on site from approximately 9am to 2pm (with a break for lunch), and return to the Museum at 2:30 pm. If the weather is poor the class will be held indoors at the Museum of Ontario Archaeology.
