Course Description:

The interrelationship of language, race, and ethnicity is complex and multifaceted. We will begin by generating an understanding of each of these concepts and seeing how they intersect. The focus will be on linguistic anthropology methods that allow us to understand the ways in which language is being used to talk about, express and identify race and ethnicity. Examples will be drawn cross-culturally and cross-linguistically, and topics will be varied.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Read, summarize, and critically evaluate language-related literature from academic and popular sources about race and ethnicity.
- Locate and synthesize research findings in linguistic anthropology with the purpose of formulating and effectively communicating well-supported arguments about race and ethnicity.
- Recognize, understand and respect the complexity of cultural and linguistic diversity in the past and the present, locally and globally about race and ethnicity.
- Appreciate the history, key arguments and applications of different theoretical approaches used in linguistic anthropology about language, race and ethnicity.
- Identify, evaluate and employ, in an ethical manner, appropriate methods for conducting anthropological research on language, race, and ethnicity.

Exam 1 and 2 - 25% each

The exams will take place during class in our regular classroom. There will be no make-up test unless you provide documentation from Academic Counseling. Students arriving more than 20 minutes after the exam has begun will not be admitted. Details about the format of the exam will be given in class.

Quizzes on Readings - 20%

Every week there will be a reading quiz on OWL that will cover the lecture materials for the current week. This quiz will need to be completed 30 minutes before every class. This will ensure that everyone is up to date on the readings and will be able to follow and contribute to class presentations and discussions. The lowest quiz will be dropped; because each one is worth less than 3% there will be no makeups. Note that there is a quiz on the first class.

Tutorial Attendance 5%

Please come to tutorial class regularly, prepared to be an active participant. At the end of each tutorial class, I will ask you to write the following on an index card:

- your name and the date
- the most important thing you learned in class
- a question you still have (optional)

These index cards will help me keep track of my own performance. They will also serve as a record of your attendance. If you leave early or forget to hand in a card, the attendance for that day may be forfeited. You are allowed two unjustified absences throughout the semester. Any other absences must be justified in advance. An email before class will suffice in many circumstances. More than two absences will affect your attendance grade

Final Exam - 25%

The final exam will be administered according to the final exam schedule, date TBA. Conflicts with other exams will be dealt with according to policy. It will be a 2 hour exam covering the last third of the material. Details about the final exam will be given in class. No makeup will be administered unless the proper procedures are followed. Likewise, students needing special accommodation must follow the proper channels.
