Course Description:

Sociocultural Anthropologists commonly debate the foundations of their discipline. What are the goals of Sociocultural Anthropology? How should we be doing it, and why? For whom do we do it? This course contextualizes such key debates focusing especially on what they tell us about the discipline's past, present, and future.

Course Materials:

There are three required books for this course. Physical copies of all books are strongly encouraged. We will use them in class.

1) Tracie Canada, Tackling the Everyday: Race and Nation in Bog Time College Football, 1st Edition, University of California Press, 2025.

2) Paul Rabinow, Reflections on Fieldwork in Morrocco, 2nd Edition, University of California Press, 2007.

This book costs \$38.00. Students are welcome to purchase second-hand or earlier editions of this book. They are abundant and inexpensive. Weldon has a digital copy available.

3) Todd Meyers, Gone Gone, 1st Edition. Duke University Press, 2025.

This book costs \$34.00. Weldon has a digital copy available.
