Course Description:

This course is an opportunity for students to expand their understanding of how material culture comes into being, how archaeologists conceive, study, and make meaning from those material practices, and what this imperfect record can tell us about human experiences over time, and what it can't tell us about human heritage in the present. The course will be structured around major intellectual trends in archaeology, offering students an opportunity to explore key concepts for the discipline, as well as think about and experience of material practice and making meaning from those practices.

Course Materials:

Readings will be a critical part of in-class discussion and projects. Readings will be available online.

Evaluation:

Grades will be based on the following:

Reflections/Commentaries on assigned readings and discussion (15%; 10%)
