Course Description:

Anthropology is known for providing holistic and nuanced understandings of human life. It offers a valuable set of tools for understanding human diversity and for examining the social conditions cultural influences that shape our everyday worlds as well as the myriad ways that people respond to these conditions. These tools are not only effective for generating new theories about humanity, but also can be applied to projects that may help to improve people's lives. In this course, we will examine the application of anthropology and some of the opportunities and challenges that applied anthropology presents to the discipline.

In this course, you will encounter different forms of applied anthropology including practicing anthropology, governance anthropology, and engaged anthropology. Through these forms, you will discuss the unique contribution that anthropology can make to the world as well as some of the ethical and practical considerations that applied anthropology introduces to the field. You will have the opportunity to design an applied anthropology research project and consider how these practices will contribute to your own future career.
